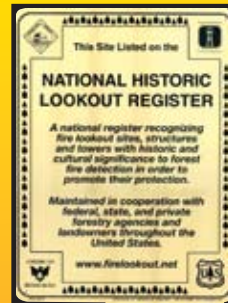

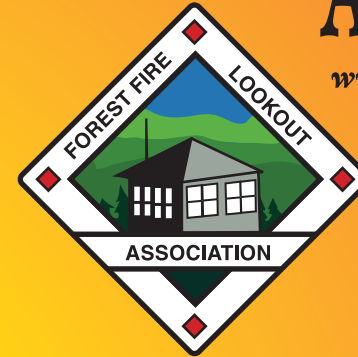

What is the FFLA?

Once there were 8000 fire lookouts across the U.S., but now only 2000 remain. Of these, 600 are in active use for fire detection, and 100 of these are staffed by volunteers.

The Forest Fire Lookout Association (FFLA), founded in 1990, is an organization involved in research and promoting public awareness of current and former forest fire lookouts sites.

The organization is active in restoration of lookouts in many states working with federal, state and local agencies as well as private landowners.

FFLA members include lookout enthusiasts, hikers, foresters, conservationists, fire management personnel and many others.

Two annual conferences are held every summer, one in the west, one in the east. They feature interesting speakers, training, sharing and trips to lookouts in the area.

The association has chapters or official Representatives in all 50 states, plus Australia and Canada. More chapters are organized as opportunities arise.

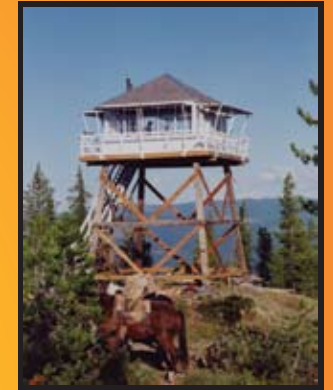

Lookouts Across America



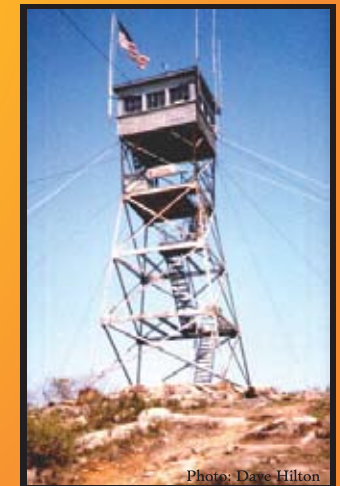
Lookouts are conscientious and devoted to duty and the lonely assignment. Helen Dowe's station in 1919 was the Devil's Head Fire Lookout, Pike National Forest, Colorado. It is still active.



Arid Peak Lookout on the St. Joe National Forest in Idaho is a remaining example of more than 1,000 L-4 design fire lookouts that once stood throughout the west. Built in 1934 it was restored by members of the FFLA and USFS in 1997.



Love's Lookout City of Jacksonville, TX
Love's Lookout is a remnant of a network of fire towers in the piney woods that once numbered more than 100. The 125' Aermotor tower with 7'x7' metal cab was built by the Texas Forest Service in 1935 and remained in service until 1970.



Red Hill Fire Tower, Moultonboro, New Hampshire continues in active service.
